F3J Intro Jim Monaco - CD

We had great attendance for our annual F3J Intro contest. This event always generates a lot of enthusiasm and this year was no exception. It is basically a F3J event with winches. As usual we used our fly and fetch matrix to schedule flyers and retrievers and it worked well. With this event every flyer had the ability to relaunch and they did – numerous times. That means the most retrievers had to fetch the lines twice per round. Everybody kept up very well! This event has some different rules, like you MUST land before the window time expires to get your landing points, and you MUST land within 75 meters of your landing spot to get flight points. As CD I had the unfortunate need to enforce these rules a couple of times. I'd like to thank the affected flyers (they know who they are..) for their gracious acceptance of the penalties. I HATE doing that...

Things were running pretty well, but the sprinkler continued to advance on us and we had no choice but to halt the proceedings for a protracted "lunch break". Because of the way the wind was blowing we needed to wait an extraordinary amount of time for the sprinkler to clear the launch zone. During the lunch break the fun-fly airplanes came out with Zagis and Wedgies whizzing about. A treat for many was the demonstration of REAL F3J launches. Most people who had never seen one could hardly believe them. All of this placed us well behind schedule. With 28 flyers needing 6 flight groups per round, 10 minute rounds plus prep time we did well to get in 3 rounds of flying. Conditions were very difficult with lots of missed times and nearly every group launching twice.



Ryan O'Hara bested Art Ries to take the top Novice place. This was a good performance for difficult conditions for the novices. Dr. Dan took top honors in the Sportsman class beating out new member Mike Verzuh by only 24 points! In Masters class both Jon Padilla and Dusty Miller flew 3 perfect rounds to tie for first place. Although both get 1000 points for season totals – a flyoff was required for bragging rights and awards. At the beginning of the fly-off Jon popped off during the launch, quickly brought it down and relaunched. All of this cost him 48 seconds and ultimately the contest. Dusty flew a great round getting his time and a good landing to capture the top spot. From a personal standpoint I'd like to thank Bob Rice who did most of the scoring for the day and Dr. Dan who spent a lot of time running the flight line. This helped me enormously! I'd also like to thank the winchmasters who – without fail – get the equipment to the field and get it set up for all of us to enjoy! See you in October when I get to do the CD thing again... *Jim*

August Handlaunch Contest Report CD John Kappus

August 18th marked the season's last hand launch contest. This certainly has been a year of some of the greatest changes in the sport. Most of these changes center around the 'new' launch technique of sidearm or discus style launches. Holding on to a wing tip and spinning around certainly produces much higher launch speeds as well as markedly different loads on the airframe. Designers have been challenged to optimize a large number of factors to produce increasingly better DLGs. This has resulted in a number of 'new' designs. This launch shift has resulted in a great demand for the better of these ships that has, at times, outstripped supply. Contest attendance has been down this year, both locally and at the National level as some people wait for designs to settle out, or simply can't get what they want. Although the best of these ships definitely launch higher and float almost as well as the old javelin designs, I would really encourage anyone with only a javelin design to come out and enjoy the contest. DLG do make the contest tasks easier, but the skills learned thermaling a javelin plane and practicing the different contest tasks will directly apply to DLG (as well as working those low altitude thermals in TD contests). On the right day, you might even be in contention for the win as demonstrated this past weekend at the MARCS contest where the contest was won by a BUILT UP javelin plane! Personally, most of my lunchtime practice flying is still with javelin launch planes. I feel I get more practice with small low-level bubbles this way.



Enough of the soap box, now on with the contest report. Sunday morning greeted us with breezy conditions. The day started on the wrong foot when three aircraft where damaged BEFORE the pilots meeting! Tom Gressman was forced to withdraw before the start, as his new Sidewinder was not field repairable. This left 9 pilots, 5 discus, and 4 javelin. Rick Walba joined us all the way from New England. Rick showed up at the field courtesy of the airport hotel shuttle with a big cardboard box housing a Sidewinder. Rick is one of the fellows involved in semi-kitting Mark Drela's 2 meter Allegro. Rick was directly responsible for sourcing that tailboom. This same boom is now used by Denny Maize on the DLG X-Terminator Pro. Denny just hasn't gotten around to finishing Rick's plane yet! I have a few of these booms. They are large diameter and VERY stiff while only a bit heavier than most of the wimpy stuff out there. It was great getting to fly with Rick.

Previous contests have used the tasks from day one of the International. I tried to provide variety by using tasks from the NATS, day two of the International, and even one from a BAR/CSS contest. We flew 7 rounds to give everyone a lot of flight time. Fortunately, the wind even cooperated by dying down before the first round. We even managed to finish by 3:00. Task 1 gave people some trouble as it replaced the usual 5-second ladder task with one with 15-second increments. This really hurt the points if you missed the last flight. Task 7 puzzled a lot of people, as the best strategy isn't obvious. Shannon flew it as a one second ladder task (even changing planes to a Feather XL for precision timing), others flew it as ~15 second ladder, and Jim Newcomb almost won the round with a built up poly by coreing a big one and maxing his third flight.

The scoring stayed interesting with Skip taking a huge hit in round 1. Skip won the next 5 rounds to claw his way back. He was finally able to grab second place from Shannon by just 4 points with a solid score in round 7. I was also able to win 5 rounds to maintain first place from round 3 on. Joseph once again put in a solid performance with a secure fourth. Jack Zika was high javelin scorer in fifth and would have been closer if he didn't break his elevator in the last round. Shannon was once again the 'midair king' as he got in at least two 'attacks'.

I flew a poly homebrew with a gyro. Skip flew his Taboo with no gyro, but had a Raptor with gyro as a backup. Shannon flew a Raptor in all rounds except #7. Joseph flew his Raptor as well.

Out of the purchased sailplanes, the Raptors seemed to launch the highest. The Taboo seemed to be a great choice with good launches and better flight characteristics than the Raptor. The Sidewinders seems to fly pretty well but launches very oddly. They seem OK on gentle launches, but look like they twist themselves all up when thrown hard. The tail wag can get a bit scary. This might be due to a long but flexy tailboom. It was interesting to watch Jim Newcomb launch both the Sidewinder and the Raptor. With the same technique, the results were greatly different.

Gyros seem to improve the launch. A good plane, thrown consistently, probably doesn't need one, but they seem to save both marginal designs as well as the occasional bad release. It really is hard to truly screw up a throw with a gyro present.

For those that attended, thanks for a well flown contest. For those that didn't make it, you missed a fun time and we hope to see you next year! *John*

Club Business

It appears that we have little or no interest in the way that F3J scores are computed, this opinion is based on the fact that not enough members showed up at the last meeting to have a quorum for a vote. Neither did any members contact any of the board to discuss their views. Since the importance of the August vote was to determine the appropriate method of scoring season points for specific application to the F3J Team Selections that will happen prior to the next meeting, as scorekeeper I intend to apply the same rules that we used at the RMSA F3J contest to the Team Selections.
