Handlaunch Contest Report July 18th John Kappus CD

One and a half feet of snow in the mountains on Friday wasn't too encouraging for our last Hand Launch contest of the season, but by Sunday, we were greeted with incredible Colorado weather. Winds were light to moderate at times making the tasks challenging, but there were thermals to be had most of the time.

We had improved attendance, which included Lenny Keer and Andrew Wright, down from Greeley, to show us how to fly. Joseph Newcomb, fresh from his 5th place World Championship F3J finish, promised he'd go easy on us and not embarrass us too badly. Cody Remington and his dad Hal came out to watch the activities, and after watching them fly during the lunch/sprinkler break, we convinced them that they were really good enough to fly with us. They took turns flying practice with us in the B group for the rest of the contest. Turns out that 'good enough' was an understatement, as Hal would have won the round on his first attempt.

We flew 7 rounds of tasks from the IHLGF with seeded groups for the last 3 rounds. We even included the dreaded 'ladder task' of increasing flight times just because Joseph likes it (after all he is World Class so earns the choice). This task, which isn't one of my favorites, provided a humorous moment when I almost botched it up right at the beginning. I landed the 15 second flight at my feet and went to grab and throw quickly only to find that the plane's nose was stuck in the grass and wouldn't come out. Rather than break it, I tried to stop my forward progress instantly. Turns out I lost my footing and I ended up flat on my back with my hand on the plane, the nose still stuck, and the clock ticking. Hope it looked better that it felt! I had another interesting round during a down lift cycle. With

everyone else falling out of the sky, I flew across the field where they were mowing the grass. I got a small bump passing over an idling mower at 30 feet. I circled this 'active' thermal, never gaining or losing, until I got my max just as the mower resumed operation. In round 6, Joseph was finally successful in ending my 14 consecutive round winning streak with a near perfect task. Just to prove that that wasn't a fluke, he did it again in round 7 to achieve a close 2nd place for the contest. Bob Vixie, launching highest as always, finished third.

This was a fun last contest at the RMSA field, but don't forget Bob's Colorado Springs contest in October. The Springs contest will even count towards season points!

2004 Electric World Champs - York, England

A couple of weeks ago I was fortunate enough to attend the electric World Champs as a helper on the US F5B team. The contest was held in England and featured electric glider (F5B) competition, and electric pylon racing (F5D). This event takes place every two years, bringing together competitors from around the world. This year there were teams from 18 countries entered.

F5B is a multitask electric soaring event. It starts with a distance task, requiring the pilot to fly as many laps as possible in 200 seconds. The motor can only be used outside the course to climb for altitude. When the distance time ends, the pilot immediately climbs up and starts a 10 minute thermal duration task that concludes with a spot landing. A good overview of F5B competition can be found in the August "Quiet and Electric Flight" magazine, and online at www.f5b.co.uk/

Despite the sometimes soggy English weather, five rounds of F5B were completed with the German team claiming victory. The top fliers were from Germany, Switzerland, Italy, and Austria. The US team had two members in the top ten. The third US team pilot had some hardware problems and placed 23rd, putting the US team in 5th place. It was a real treat to see the best F5B pilots in the world compete against each other. There were a couple of new developments in models and some new batteries that are becoming available. It was also interesting to watch the different flying styles that people had. It was an educational trip for me that I hope will help to improve my own F5B performance. The US team selections for the 2006 World Champs will be held next summer, and I'll be working towards earning a slot on the F5B team.
