# USA F3J SOARING TEAM SELECTIONS VOLUNTEER RAFFLE GRAND PRIZE A COMPLETE AIRTRONICS STYLUS RADIO SYSTEM!!

August 19-21, 2005

That's right we are giving away a complete Airtronics Stylus Computer Radio system INCLUDING the card of your choice, Glider, Akro, Helicopter.

The Rocky Mountain Soaring Association is the host club for the competition to select the United States F3J Soaring Team to represent the US at the World Championships in Martin Romania next year. This event will be held during three days **August 19 through August 21.** 

F3J is an exciting – human tow – simultaneous launch event, with lots of action and strategy. This event will require a number of volunteers to support official timing activities for the competitors and other miscellaneous tasks. You will have the opportunity to see some of the world's best soaring pilots competing for the privilege of making the United States Soaring Team. If you intend to come and watch – you could just as easily be a volunteer. You will be up close and personal to the best pilots in the world – watching their techniques and hearing their strategies. *No experience needed!!!* The most needed help is for officials to time the competitor flights. If you can push a button on a stopwatch you can be a timer. Volunteers can receive training prior to the contest – the rules are pretty simple. On Friday afternoon August 19th RMSA personnel will conduct a training session at the RMSA club field lasting no more than 1 hour to familiarize volunteers with the watches and when to start and stop timing. If you cannot make this training session we will conduct the training immediately prior to each shift.

In order to encourage volunteers to donate their valuable time Airtrionics has generously donated a complete Airtronics STYLUS radio as the grand prize. This system includes: transmitter, receiver, 141 servos and choice of feature card. Various other prizes will also be in the raffle. Here is how it works:

- 1. For every 4 hours that a volunteer works, they will receive 2 raffle tickets.
- 2. Volunteers who commit to working prior to July 19th and sign up for specific times receive double tickets for their committed times.
  - 3. Volunteers that commit to the entire 3 days prior to July 19th will receive a bonus of 10 tickets.

If you can work 1 day you get 4 tickets – if you commit to that day before July 19th you get 8 tickets total. If you work all three days you get 12 tickets. If you sign up and commit to these days before July 19th you double that plus 10 bonus tickets for working every day - for a total of 34 tickets.

We should be able to get a few rounds in before they get here. We set out the winches to the south, had the pilots meeting, and the sprinklers were on us. Darn they move fast. I made the decision to move. Lots of work, but I figured better now and have the rest of the day to fly. We moved north past the sprinklers and set back up. The wind had died and we did have a wonderful day of flying. Note-to-self: Don't set up in front of the sprinklers. It's just a bad idea.

The turnout was pretty light. We had 8 pilots show up. A few members were in Oregon at the electric event and I'm sure several were on vacations. Shannon showed up after a long absence. Was great to see him back out. We flew F3J on winches and got 6 rounds in. The conditions were challenging at time and booming at others. We showed up Sunday morning to the promise of a weather change from the unbelievably hot conditions of the previous week. Well, we got the change accompanied by high winds. Bob Vixie, probably like a bunch of others, didn't even make the trip out, so you know it was windy! We did have the pleasure of having two first time flyers show up, Ken Jochim, and new junior Daniel Kuik. We waited for about an hour for the sprinklers to move hoping the wind would abate at least a little. The wind did not cooperate, but Joseph and I decided to have some fun and try to fly anyway. We figured that this would be good practice for Joseph's first trip to the NATs which is usually windy. Daniel also decided to try his luck, so using Ken, John Lovins and JoElyn as timers, we flew one flight group for a quick 7 round contest. I flew with more lead than I've ever used along with a heavy wing but probably only got up to the weight of Joseph's unballasted Encore. We were all really surprised to find that the lift was pretty good. We made most of our

times! The strong lift moved downwind quickly, but you could go up enough to get back. It turned into a real test of eyesight and guts and I probably don't have to tell you that Joseph won the guts battle. Daniel flew exceptionally well in difficult conditions. We're not really sure that he's a first timer! I can certainly tell you that we all had fun!

Remember that we are taking August of from the HLG contest schedule to prepare for the team selections. Also the **September HLG contest will be rescheduled for September 4**<sup>th</sup> due to my wife's vacation plans. Take a look at Tom Gressman's for sale DLGs. These are really good planes. #### 2005 Open Contest Standings

#### NATs News by Joseph Newcomb



This was my first trip to the Nats. My first day of flying was the hand launch competition, which had 24 competitors. The day started with an interesting and somewhat confusing first round ladder task. The task was described as follows: "4 flights minimum, each flight must be longer than the last. 30 second minimum flight time." Since I hadn't flown this before, and didn't have much time to think about strategy, as I was up first, I got some advice from others, who said that I'd do best to go for progressive flights of 31, 32, 33 seconds and then begin to try for longer flights. This was a good strategy, but at this early time in the morning, the air had not developed. My turnarounds weren't too tight and it got harder and harder to beat my last flight. In one flight I was unable to beat my last longest score by one second, so I gave up more than a minute. The next two rounds were more conventional tasks, and I won both of them, beating Phil Barnes for the only two rounds he didn't win in the whole contest. In those rounds, I only beat Phil by doing quick turn-arounds, averaging 1.8 seconds with tip catches every time.

The conditions were difficult and many of the tasks were interesting. In one round, where the task was to fly two five minute flights, I flew 2:30 and 3:00 and that was close to winning the round. It was difficult to keep your spirits up because you felt like you were doing poorly. In the end, the amazing Phil Barnes came out on top. He was clearly the highest launcher and knew the limits of his plane well. I wound up in sixth place, one point behind Larry Jolly. I flew the Encore, which did well.

F3J was a two-day contest on Saturday-Sunday, with 44 competitors. The conditions were very different than here in Colorado. The thermals seemed especially light to me, and traveled downwind far. Some rounds had good thermal lift and others had nearly none at all. Sometimes the best strategy was just to hang.

Tom Keisling was impressive throughout the contest and wound up winning. He flew his own design, ultra-light plane. This is the latest version of the planes he flew at the World's last year. As expected, his plane flew extremely well in the light conditions the first day. It was surprising that such a light plane was able to compete well in windy conditions the second day. Some people think that this type of plane could be the future of F3J.

We've heard that the model will be coming out soon, called the Supra.

Unfortunately, I came up just short of the fly-offs in 11th place. Like many other pilots, I landed a plane out in the cornfield on Sunday. The corn is about 9 feet tall, so it can be pretty hard to find planes. I learned an important lesson about the value of identifying a line of sight when a plane goes down. In the rush to get you second plane in the air, it is important to stop and determine an accurate line of sight to where the plane went down. Unfortunately, I failed to do this and spent at least an hour searching for the plane, along with several other helpers.

Overall the contest was great. I learned a lot about different conditions.

I had a lot of support. Special thanks to Larry Jolly and Craig Greening who took me in on their team.

#### RMSA Flyers Dominate Alpine F5J Contest by Lenny Keer





Each year Quiet Flyer magazine puts on their Alpine Soaring Adventure in the mountains of eastern Oregon. This year, they decided to also include an electric F5J contest to bring some attention to this competition format. To make things interesting, it was decided to have cash awards and Quiet Flyer, Hacker USA, and Northeast Sailplanes stepped up to sponsor the \$6000 total purse. With a start like that, this should have been a sold out venue, but the sporadic advertising and somewhat inconvenient location kept the pilot's list short. The event was held on Sunday, July 10<sup>th</sup> and Monday, July 11<sup>th</sup>.

The contest used the "Unlimited Motor Run" format that is becoming very popular. This format provides all of the fun of F3J flying without any towing hassles. Within a 10-minute window, the planes are launched and each pilot climbs for as much or as little time as he chooses. Once he shuts his motor off his duration time begins counting and the motor cannot be restarted. Just as in F3J, the plane must be landed before the 10-minute window expires in order to receive landing points. A computer was used to monitor each pilot's motor run. SP400 and Unlimited classes were both flown.

The field was a mowed hay field near Joseph, Oregon. Not really ideal, but workable. One nice amenity was a large metal barn on the site where the pit area was set up. This provided a welcome shelter from the occasional showers on Sunday and shade from the sun on Monday.

When the dust settled, Jon Padilla took first, Steve Suntken was third, and I placed fourth in Unlimited class. In SP400, Steve was first, Jon was second, and I was third. It was a great showing for RMSA and over \$4000 of the total purse came back to Colorado!

The next big F5J event will be closer to home, in Albuquerque in October and we'll be having a small F5J warm-up event here prior to that. If you have an electric sailplane that you'd like to put to some good use, bring it out and join the fun!

Take I-76 to exit 16. Turn left and follow the frontage road to the stoplight and turn east onto 120th eastbound towards the airport.


Take 120th East to Tower Rd. Take 120th
