In preparation for the F3J Team Selections I chose to run an F3J with winches event. As a little bit if help, I decided to run a 15 minute round as the first round to see what we might face in the TS event. 13 pilots showed up ready to do battle. The ever elusive Shannon Bingham showed up as well as newcomer junior Daniel Kuik. Dan had set his sights on trying for the US F3J Junior team and this was his first actual contest.

Surprisingly, in the first flight of 15 minutes, nearly everyone got their time. It looked like the 15 minute rounds at the TS might not be so tough. We managed 5 rounds and the lift was mostly there all day. If you made a wrong decision, however, the sink was there to greet you.

In the Sportsman class, Steve Suntkin had some aircraft problems and was unable to finish. Daniel Kuik took top honors and flew very well. This was a great warm-up for him.

In Masters class you needed to avoid the big hits to stay in the wood. Joseph Newcomb was called for an early launch and failed to relite, and that cost him a spot in the top five.

Cody Remington flew very well, and finished in 5<sup>th</sup> place – no small feat for this crowd. John Kappus had a minor hit and that took him into 4<sup>th</sup> place. The rest of the gang had no real hits in time or landings so only a few seconds made the difference in the placings. Jon Padilla flew a great contest and finished in 3<sup>rd</sup> place. Bob Lewan did everything right and still came in 2<sup>nd</sup> only 16 raw points behind the first place finisher, Skip Miller. Skip flew a flawless contest and showed that he was well prepared for the coming Team Selection event.

Everyone did a great job setting up and tearing down, and a special thanks to all the people that pitched in to renumber the landing tapes. It went very fast and saved me a lot of work.

#### F3J USA Team Selection Contest Report by Jim Monaco

It was a dark and cloudy day... Well not really – only part of it. The US F3J Team selections went off without a hitch Aug 19-21. Since I already thanked all the helpers in the Presidents Message, this report will concentrate on the event. Thursday practice chose to be windier than normal for our August days, and was a foreshadowing of the "interesting" weather to bless our event. With logistics with the sod farm management all set, I was comfortable that we would not have to contend with the sprinkler or mowing during the 3 days of the contest. Unfortunately some miscommunication with the sod farm worked caused us some grief. We were notified by the staff that the area South of the road to the sprinkler post was freshly seeded a couple of days before the event – so we would be constrained to the area to the North. No problem – there is plenty of space to the North. Then on practice day they decided to PLOW an area at the North end of the field. This severely constrained the size of our field setup. We had just barely enough room to set up the lines, room for the towers and the landing areas. But we could make it work.

Friday (the first contest day) dawned bright with a wind from the south and most forecasts calling for south/southeast winds – and that would be perfect. So we set up launching to the South. Shortly after the first couple of groups, the wind shifted out of the north and we launched downwind all morning. The contest was running smoothly, however, and Byron called for a short lunch break and we swapped ends of the field. It was a pattern to be repeated each day.

In an effort to speed up the contest I tried something new and it worked quite well. I wanted to reduce the prep time if everyone was ready, but I knew that some teams were towing for themselves and might need more than the 2 minute prep that I was proposing, and I strongly felt that teams that need the full normal 5 minute prep time should get it. So I made up an orange flag for each lane and at the beginning of each group the CD would announce the beginning of the slot. He would ask if each side of the flight line was ready for a 2 minute prep. If any lane waved the flag, we immediately started the 5 minute prep. If no flags were waved we started a 2 minute prep. Once the prep started we did not stop it. I was afraid that there would be a flag every slot, meaning we always had a 5 minute prep time, but amazingly the pilots wanted to speed things up as well and I would estimate that more than 50% of the flights occurred with the 2 minute prep.

As I said above, we flew a lot of downwind flights that caused a lot of approaches to be low over the flight line which was declared a safety area. Because we were constrained on the placement of the landing area because of the newly plowed area to the North, the LZs were closer to the flight line than we wanted. This made flying over the safety area above 3m very difficult. Byron handled this very well, by not calling this a violation. For Day 2 he did the right thing by announcing that if we have the same conditions, that a safety violation would be called if you hit a person or thing in the flight line, or landed in the flight line and that your approaches needed to be made thru your lane but the 3m rule was waived for that area. This worked very well (for the next 2 days).

As expected from this group, there were no easy slots. Someone got away in nearly every group. The "well" seemed to the on the East side of the field and far away. Pilots that drew lanes on the West side of the field were at a definite disadvantage in reaching the lift. Since that was also the downwind side most of the contest, it was doubly difficult to get there and stay in sight. Even Joe Wurts remarked if we were having a soaring contest or a vision test...

Day 1 ended uneventfully with 6 rounds in with Skip, Joe and tom Kiesling leading the pack, in that order. Day 2 was much like day 1, except we had a front coming in and the wind picked up. When we swapped the lines and got our first upwind launches, a bunch of hoots and hollers celebrated the big launches. As the afternoon progressed the winds became a challenge and some of the pilots were going waaaay downwind to get their thermals. Nothing was easy and many pilots took some big hits. In the late afternoon a storm was approaching from the west. The 12<sup>th</sup> round had 2 flights left in it, but the sprinklers came past the towers and made towing impossible. Between the sprinkler problem, the approaching storm and having to get 2 groups in to finish the round, Byron cancelled the round. Since the TS committee had determined that the entire day 3 would be 15 minute rounds, he decided not to finish the round in the morning.

Day 3 was the 15 minute round day. Again the lift was there if you had the guts and eyesight to get to it. Many more pilots had a difficult time with the day. Since we needed 5 rounds to have a throwout, Byron did everything possible to ensure that. It was touch and go for a while as a storm cruised across south of us with

lightning, but it abated enough to try to get the last flight group in. The storm held off and we managed to get the last round completed. Joe Wurts already locked up his position and decided to do a very short tow. With about a 2 second tow he got a 14:56.57 flight, but blew the landing. Larry Jolly took the final round with a 14:54.04 100.

The scores were very close with Tom Kiesling taking top honors with his hand made Supra, Joe flying to 2<sup>nd</sup> with his ICON and Skip mostly flying his Pike.

The Juniors flew very well also. Joseph Newcomb took 1<sup>st</sup>, Casey Adamcyzk took 2<sup>nd</sup> and Cody Remington taking the third and final slot for the junior team. Daniel Kuik flew a GREAT contest considering his first open class launches were only a couple of weeks prior to the event. He had a tough day on Sunday but was certainly in contention the whole contest. He'll be another darn junior to look out for.

All in all – a great contest and as usual, the best pilots came out on top. Congratulations to the US F3J Soaring Team with 3 of the 6 pilots from Colorado!!!

## Club Winches Now Kept at the Field by Mike Verzuh

We are going to try something a little different with the club winches. As most folks are aware all of the new club winches are kept in a trailer donated to the club by Mark Howard – Thanks again Mark! This has turned out to be very efficient and does not require club Winch Masters as in the past. However, on the down side, the trailer must travel over 100 miles for each contest, adding wear and tear, and the winches are largely unavailable for club members to sport fly with. Our sod farm owner has graciously granted the club space to store the trailer on the farm's equipment area. This will allow a club member (once he goes through a quick winch safety and use briefing) to use a winch for sport flying more freely. The trailer will be stored on the West field with the Sod Farm equipment. There is someone in that area 24x7, and it is off the path of the road.

The only problem we have is there is no power available to charge winch batteries. So... a compromise solution has been proposed, and we have implemented it. The winches will be available, but you must bring your own battery. This is not such a tough thing as one can purchase a great battery at Wal-Mart for around \$50. The other option is to become a club Battery Master. We have six club batteries, and we will purchase two more. That will leave the club a total of eight batteries (we have six winches). We are soliciting members to take care of these club batteries. The only requirement is to insure that your charged battery makes it to the monthly Open contests – charge it, bring it or get it to your buddy that will be attending a contest to bring it. The good news is we already have four members that have stepped up to become a Battery Master. They are: Skip Miller, Joe and Jim Newcomb, Jim Monaco, and Mike Verzuh. In addition our new member Daniel Kuik is caring for a complete winch and battery. This means we only need three more Battery Master volunteers to step up. Please contact me directly to volunteer, and I will make arrangements to get you a battery.

If you are interested in using a club winch please contact me for the first time, and I will insure you have all the details for trailer access. Also if you are a new member and have not had a winch operation and safety briefing we will coordinate that.
