Contest Report, Open Contest October 9th by Mike Verzuh CD

So.... I went so far as to predict we would have wonderful Colorado blue skies weather for the October contest. Mother Nature stepped in to correct my foolish prognostications, producing a beautiful day on Saturday, but Sunday arrived clouded over. I think this is the forth or fifth contest this year that we have had good weather on Saturday and bad on Sunday – luck of the draw I guess. The good news is we had 11 fearless contestants arrive. The plan was to set out the club's full complement of winches so we could get in as many rounds as possible before the predicted storm's arrival in the afternoon. Everyone pitched in setting up the winches, the sprinklers were off, the wind was from the North at 4-8 mph, and we kicked off a fast paced contest.

The flying was pleasantly surprising with buoyant air and as the morning progressed good lift. Actually we would have killed for such consistent air at the F3J team selections. It just goes to show we don't need clear skies for soaring. Because we could run two groups per round we were able to get in a lot of fast paced flying. We started of with a 6-minute round. This was very achievable so I increased the round time, even throwing in a 10 minuter to challenge everyone. To no avail most pilot were able to get their times. We were able to get in 5 rounds before the weather moved in. The top four places were only separated by 15 raw points! Joseph had an incredible low-level save, but just came up short on the landing. I came up short on one landing as well. With everyone flying and landing extremely well, these miscues sent the two of us to the bottom of the pack. Cody had some bad luck loosing his light Eraser Xtreme on launch, but flew well, even without a nose skeg on his backup. In the end Bob Lewan prevailed for a 1^{st.} Bob is really flying well this year. He and Skip are only .02 points apart for year-end top dog! Dr. Dan came on very strong with a second place finish with Skip in 3rd, John Kappus in 4th and Lenny in 5th. In the end we had a very nice day.

October Handlaunch Contest Report by John Kappus CD

Back by popular demand, one last HLG contest was added to the season. Eight fliers came out to enjoy a wonderful Inian summer day. This contest was about fun and helping newcomers. Hal and Cody Remington and Greg Dubbe came out to add to our ranks. New pilots with lower season point totals were allowed first pick of their coach and timers. The tasks were also a little lower key with task time being shorter than working time to allow for more relaxed landings and rethrows. It turns out that this, and the great flying group, kept the contest close with less than 60 points separating the top five. Unfortuneately, the weather started to change after the lunch break with the winds coming up. The second group of round 5 suffered through some of the worst lift conditions I've seen. The winning score from this group for the 4 best flights was just 180, or an average of 45 seconds a flight. We paused at this point, but the lift never returned or the winds soften, so the contest was called complete after 5 rounds.

The top 6 pilots all won at least one round. Cody flew solidly. He was impressive in his first HLG contest (no surprise there). Joseph and Bob were always in the hunt with Bob winning the most rounds. I flew a heavy aileron wing I made 2 years ago with a 'new' setup. Although I gave up my usual 20 percent weight advantage, the plane showed some promise, particularly if it went on a diet. I guess I know what I'll be working on this winter. The surprise of the contest was John Lovins. He flew extremely well winning two rounds and never dropping more than a few points in the other rounds. It seemed that every time I looked, John had quietly thermaled out in the other corner. Regretably, I accidentally switched Cody's and John's scores in one round. At the contest, I announced Cody as 2nd and John as 5th when it really was the other way around. This shows just how close the score were! I appologise to John for the error and hope that everyone will congratulate him on his achievement!

RMSA ScaleFest Report by Lenny Keer

We held our second annual scale soaring day last weekend at the sod farm. The day started out cold, with a heavy overcast. Before long, several cars and pickups pulling trailers began filling the parking lot. As the sun started to become more visible through the cloud cover, a number of shiny white scale sailplanes were assembled on the grass. The two tow planes were fired up and flew a few warm-up circuits of the field.

We had about 8 scale sailplanes out and took turns getting towed up to soaring altitude. One of the tow planes was a large (35%?) scale aerobatic plane with plenty of horsepower under the hood. This really made the tows easy, almost like a mild winch launch. The clouds steadily burned off and we had a great day with sunshine and a mostly clear blue sky. It really turned into a perfect fall day to fly scale sailplanes!

The event was run as a relaxed fun-fly, but we also were flying for the Gold Medal Soaring Award program, sponsored by Quiet Flyer magazine. Each pilot simply times his own flight from tow release till touch down, and there are award certificates given for flights exceeding 30 minutes, 60 minutes, and 120 minutes. During this event, Skip was awarded a Gold certificate for his 2 hour, seven minute flight with his Nimbus. I was on the way to 2 hours, but was concerned about my receiver battery in my Nimbus. I landed at 83 minutes for a Silver certificate. Also, a Bronze certificate was awarded to Rich O'Connell for his 31 minute flight on his Ka6.

Thanks to all who came out to fly or just watch. Everyone seemed to have a good time and we will do it again next year!

Practice Makes Perfect by John Kappus

Does prepareing for the USA F3J team selections make you a better pilot? Does practicing F3J landings without a skeg improve your AMA landings? A quick look at the October score sheet answers these questions with a resounding YES!!

A look at the top 4 pilots landing scores showed that the 4th best lander averaged 95.5 points on the AMA tape. The best lander averaged 97 points with a worst landing less than .5 meter from the mark!

Timing precision was equally impressive. Four out of the top 5 pilots dropped less than 1.5 secons per flight with the winner dropping just 3 seconds in 5 rounds. I guess practice does pay!

Albuquerque F5J Report by Lenny Keer

The 2005 Electric Soaring World Challenge was held in Albuquerque, NM in October again this year and Steve Suntken and I went down to represent RMSA in the competition. The "new" F5J rules were used, which allow each pilot to choose his own motor run time. The entire flight is flown inside a 10-minute window, just like F3J and the duration time begins after the motor is shut off. This format encourages lower launches so it is less of an eyesight contest and much more of a thermal contest.

Friday was a warm-up day and there was a good crowd there enjoying the perfect weather. Sunny and warm with a very light breeze. If only we hadn't used up the nice weather so soon! Saturday began with heavy overcast and a VERY low ceiling. The SP400 group was flown first and could only climb to around 400 feet before disappearing into the cloud base. The ceiling did improve a bit and I think we finished about 1 ½ rounds before the rain shut us down for the day.

Sunday morning came and the rain had stopped. Unfortunately, there was a thick blanket of fog hanging over the field. While we were standing around waiting for it to lift, several of us used our SP400 models to "explore" the limits of visibility. Finally, the fog did begin to dissipate and we resumed the competition. As the fog faded away a clear blue sky took its place. We completed another 1 ½ rounds Sunday, finishing up in early afternoon.

So, we were only able to complete 3 rounds instead of the planned 9 or 10. In SP400, Steve was 4th and I was 1st. In Unlimited we each had a bad round. Steve was 6th and I was 5th. Neither of us flew in the 7-cell class. Overall, there was a good mix of models used. The SP400 models were mostly open-bay floaters with a couple bagged wings also used. The winning model was my converted Mirage HLG, with a bagged 60" wing. The 7-cell class had a mix of high tech floaters and moldies. The winning model was a molded Graphite. The open class had moldies, obechie/foam, and AVA's competing head to head. Interestingly, in the calm, no lift conditions the AVA and similar planes were able to hang better; but when the wind came up a little and the thermals were popping, the moldies seemed to rule the sky. The winning plane in unlimited class was a molded Graphite also.

This is a nice F5J contest to attend. It is well run and not too long a drive from Denver. They'll probably be having it earlier next year in hopes of better weather.

Handlaunch Season Points Totals by John Kappus

The 2005 handlaunch glider season is now over. We had good participation this year with 13 fliers during the five event season. The competition got tighter throughout the year as the contest flying honed the piloting skills. Most Importantly, we all had a lot of fun. Our new fliers all said that they enjoyed the events and will be back. In 2006 we'll look for more ways to make newcomers comfortable. I encourage all to think about adding a HLG to your Christmas wish list. Come join in the pure thermaling fun in 2006!
