BATTERY MASTERS: Please be sure to have your batteries at the field by 8:30 AM charged & "topped up" This is our annual competition with the Pikes Peak Soaring Society. Every year we have an event hosted by the previous years winning team. We won the event last year so the event is in Colorado this year. This is a standard thermal duration event – no simultaneous launches. We will use the more generous FAI landing tapes instead of the AMA tapes. Skegs are allowed. The top 5 scoring pilots from each team are totaled to comprise a team score. Medals are awarded to the top 5 pilots from each team. The winning team earns the Challenge Cup, and the top scoring pilot on the winning team keeps the trophy until next year. The winning

team also earns home field advantage for the following year. The more pilots that come out to support the club the better!

It is always a fun event – be sure to attend.

Labor Day Weekend DLG Team Selections for 2013--Report

RMSA hosted 35 DLG pilots from across the USA over Labor Day weekend. The purpose was to select the three best Senior and three best junior DLG pilots who will represent the US at the world F3K championships contest in Denmark next year. We were faced with numerous challenges including a presidential visit that shut down the contest for most of a day. We had unusually high winds, and dust storms that shut down flying for an hour at a time. We lost count of how many times we had to take down and re-install canopies. We ended up flying 16 complete rounds out of a planned 23 rounds. It was almost 17 rounds but a huge dust storm rolled in when we were 3/4ths done with the round and we had to quit. We intentionally designed the flight tasks to stress the pilots and make it hard to achieve a maximum score. Things like starting each day at 8:00 AM with two 4 minute flights and ending the day at 7:00 PM with the Poker task brought the best pilots to the top of the list.

Note that 22 out of 32 senior pilots were within 10% of the winners score. This is an indication of how closely matched these contestants were. In the end, the winners were:

A "-" next to a score indicates a dropped round. F3K rules allow a drop round for each 5 rounds flown. Credit has to be given to the contest organizers and helpers. This document will be the standard by which all future bids will be graded. Dave Jensen was the CD and I don't know how he did it. It was a mammoth effort but everything came together even with the bad weather, schedule changes and TFRs. The pilots and supporters were kept well hydrated and fed. The entire Jensen clan worked their tails off running the contest and setting up and tearing down the equipment. Special thanks to Rita and Chris Jensen for taking care of us. Gary Jensen kept generators running all weekend to power the scoring table and charging batteries. Thanks for the gas, Gary. Kelsey Jensen did the real time scoring and posting to the web. This is a big deal and was well received by the soaring community on RCG.

F3J World Championships Johannesburg SouthAfrica

Wow – that is all I can say... How to describe such an adventure in a few paragraphs? Instead of a blow by blow I think a few highlights will suffice. We arrived mostly uneventfully, except for our junior Dominick Lewis and his Grandpa Rich Burnoski. They tried to save a few dollars and against my advise connected their trip thru London Heathrow. As we all know the Olympics was going on and that made a bad thing worse. When they went to check in they discovered that new security rules were in place and no large boxes were being allowed into Heathrow. So they did not get on the airplane and proceeded to try other ways to get their models to SA. They ultimately repackaged the planes into sport tubes and sent then via FedEx. This meant that the planes would not arrive until the day before the WC at best. There was a lot of agonizing and lots of phone calls and meetings, but the planes finally arrived.

Original predictions for weather was a lot like Phoenix in winter. Chilly in the AM and warming up into the 60s/70s during the day – breezy at times... We wished for that. It snowed in Jo'burg for the first time in 35 years! It was the first time EVER that it snowed in every SA province on the same day.. I had to send helpers out to get hats, gloves, masks and long underwear for folks. If the cold was not bad enough – we had winds that at times exceeded the FAI limit – roughly 30MPH. We toughed it out and survived the conditions with all of our pilots doing well. By the end of the prelims we had 4 of our 5 pilots in the finals and clinched the Team Gold by almost 1000 points.

The flight of the event for me was one by Daryl Perkins. A rough throw by Cody caused him to exit the line early and low – some people thought he was taking a short tow... Nope. He then ran downwind and found a little thermal and stayed with it, barely climbing and all the time going further and further downwind. He managed to stay with it even while none of the spectators could see the plane and they were a LOT closer than him. He admitted later that there were times he could not see it, but one of the callers always had it in sight, and could help him re-acquire it. He managed to get back and get a good landing keeping him in the fly offs.

The finals were decent temps but windy again. I had rounded up towing help the night before, but in the morning they didn't show. The decided to save themselves for their Junior flights without telling me. I was going crazy trying to make sure everyone had towers and finally just before the prep time started I had everything done..

The finals were a test of eyesight with lots of downwind flying. Cody had a great flight that nearly equaled Daryls. It was close right to the end but Cody made it into the Bronze medal position.

For the Juniors Tristan Sherman flew awesome and was the top qualifier in the prelims. Dillon Graves flew very well and was barely edged out for a spot in the finals. Dominick had a rough event but did well for his first WC. These kids will be very tough next cycle.

So we came home with the Team Gold and Cody with the individual Bronze – a successful event by any measure. Now it's time to rest...

The outlook was for a great weather day. It was going to be hot but very nice with light winds. We had a light turnout with all the activity surrounding the F3J World Championships, F5B preparations for Lenny and of course RMSA hosting of the F3K team selection. We had three Sportsman and three Masters attend so we set up Man-on-Man flight groups with the Sportsman always flying against Sportsman and likewise for the Masters. This worked

very well as we had balanced competition and we rotated callers throughout the day, giving everyone a chance to work together.

We had one of our newest members, Brody Wilson joined us. Brody is from the Mid-west and is finally getting settled here in the Denver area. He flew an Espada and did very well with it. It will be nice to see Brody at a few more events – welcome to RMSA!

We flew ten minute rounds all day. With six guys we ran two flight groups per round so we got a lot of flying in fast. I set a maximum round total at six which we finished by 1:30. This included a short lunch with watermelon break. The air was typical Colorado air. Light winds but things got a bit fickle and if you were in the wrong part of the sky your 10 minutes was in jeopardy. As it turned out Blayne was the only pilot to get his full time in all six rounds. Blayne flew very well all day. I was on with my landings but made too quick a decision just after launch on round 5, and I found myself in a whole pile of sink and could not get to John and Blayne.

One of our highlights came at the end when Blayne gave every pilot a copy of his new CD (Fiddle and Flute). It turns out Blayne is much more than a great sailplane pilot. This CD is fast becoming one of my wife and my favorites. You never know what will come your way at an RMSA contest!

In the end the flying and fun was great. Congratulations go to Blayne as the Masters winner and Jim Rogers as the Sportsman winner.



- **ROCKY MOUNTAIN SOARING ASSOCIATION FIELD RULES** The sod farm operations take precedence over ALL activities. We use the field at the convenience of the owner. 1. All members will follow ALL instructions from ANY sod farm personnel without question. 2. When sod farm operations are occurring during a flying session it is OUR responsibility to ensure that we will 3. not interfere with operations. If it is unclear as to what is happening or where they intend to mow or work try to talk to workers or management and always move equipment or vacate the premises if necessary. Some workers do not speak very good English – in that case you must make every effort to avoid conflict or interference with operations. Park only in the designated parking areas Do not park on grass, dirt or roads. 4. 5. Avoid setting up on newly seeded areas or young grassy areas. The nice grassy areas are better to land on anyway! 6. Establish a frequency control pole and tag system! Frequency control is to be in effect at all times!! All members will post their frequency control tags on the pole and if there are conflicts, please exercise safety sense as well as share the flight time. Parking and pit areas should be as condensed as possible for the safety of launch and landing. 7. Establish flight line areas for winch launch, high start launch, and hand launch that are separate for the sake of 8. launch, flight & landing safety. Flying over the parking/pit areas at less than 30 feet is prohibited. Doing so in competition WILL result in a zero 9. flight score and during R/R flying a disciplinary action by the club. No aerobatics or speed runs over the parking/pit/Launch/Landing zones. 10. Do not launch if a plane is circling in a launch zone: vacate the launch zone as soon as possible if someone is 11. waiting to launch. When entering a thermal occupied by other aircraft, enter in the same direction as the first aircraft 12. Landing aircraft have the right of way! 13. In the event of no mechanical retriever, please shag your own chute/line for the flight 14. Please share the usage of club equipment so that all have equal flight time. 15. Please be courteous and helpful to your fellow flyers as well as informative to all guests/spectators. Enjoy 16. yourself and others!! 17. Absolutely no debris or trash is to be left on the field! Please take it home with you for disposal. Make sure that your plane and electronics are airworthy before each flight. Exercise good safety sense in your 18. flight
- 19. The aircraft will have an identification name/address or AMA number on or in the model in case of loss.
- 20. You MUST tag your winch/high start spikes or stakes with fluorescent tape so they are easily spotted on the field by all concerned. Members may be fined \$10 for each stake or nail not so marked. Previous damage to sod farm equipment from spikes left in the ground has made this rule EXTREMELY important.
- 21. Absolutely no alcoholic beverages will be consumed, prior to or during participation in any model event on the flying field.
