Slope Site Directions

Here are some directions to our local slope sites as well as best wind directions – courtesy of Mark Howard.

For east or south to southeast winds, try NCAR (National Center for Atmospheric Research). It's on the south side of town up Table Mesa Drive from Broadway. Park in the paved lot on the south side. NCAR is a destination for hikers and has lots of trails. You may see deer or other critters there.

If the wind is from the west or northwest - take Broadway south until it becomes Highway 93. Continue south on 93 past the turn off to Eldorado Springs (Hwy170) - then up the hill. Park on a turn-out before the hill crest for west winds. Continue over the crest of the hill and park if the wind is out of the north. You have to hike a bit if you fly there.

Another good spot for west winds is the "powerlines" site. To reach the powerlines, take Highway 93 south past the turn off to Eldorado Springs -- over the aforementioned hill and about another mile to Highway 128. Head East on Hwy 128 (towards the Jeffco Airport) a couple of miles until you crest a hill with electric transmission lines crossing the highway. At the top of the hill, turn left onto a dirt/gravel road which leads back to a parking area. If you intersect McCaslin, you've gone a bit too far. You have to fly from the west side of the parking area. Do NOT cross the fence to fly, or the local fuzz may make a stink. I don't think there is a problem crossing the fence to retrieve combat casualties, however. Big air at the powerlines when the wind is doing 15-20. It still works at 5 or better. NCAR works at 5 or better too, but the other slopes do not - they are good at 10 or more.

Head on south to Lakewood (West Denver) and Bear Creek Lake Park for some of the best slopin' this side of Torrey. BIG BIG air on the big dam and nice landing areas. There is a \$3 day access fee, however. Bear Creek works for anything but south winds. Bear Creek is just off the Morrison exit on C470 on the west side of Denver. If the wind is from the south, try the park on Green Mountain just north of Bear Creek Park. You have to work your way back up the hill to West Almeda Parkway from Morrison Road. The park is just off Almeda on the south-east side of Green Mountain. You can park, and fly your model up the hill as you hike to the top.

RMSA Spring Zagi-Fest (first attempt) -- Lenny Keer

The first attempt to fly the RMSA Spring Zagi-Fest was April 2nd. Yes, I said the first attempt. (See May 21st contest announcement) Even if you weren't at the field you might remember that day. It started out overcast and calm and a little cool. As the contest got started it got a little warmer. Then, a few rays of sun battled with a few sprinkles of rain and the wind got steadily stronger. We finally declared defeat and ended the contest after three rounds. By the time we left the field the snow was starting to fly. Yep, spring flying in Colorado!

Despite the gloomy weather we had 6 pilots show up with Zagi 400's in hand. Bob Douglas was trying to psyche out the competition by demonstrating the power and speed of his franken-Zagi. Yes, a Zagi will climb vertically with a brushless motor on board! By then the rest of us were feeling slightly inadequate, but Bob brought out his stock Zagi 400 for the contest. Rounds one and two were thermal duration. The task was four minutes, including a one minute motor run to climb to altitude. The first group had some buoyancy air and easily made the time. A landing bonus was awarded for a hand catch at the end of the flight. It was fun to watch some flyers try to run up to catch their plane as it was coming in a little short. The rest of the groups had a little tougher time with the air, but it was scored man on man to keep it fair.

Round three was Zagi Bowling. Ten empty plastic milk bottles were set up in a bowling pin pattern. Each pilot got two attempts in each frame to knock down some pins. This was harder to do than you would think and there were lots of "gutterballs" flown. By now the wind was picking up and we had to put a little water into each bottle to keep them in place. This also made them a little tougher to tip over. Since we didn't have time to bowl ten frames, we started everyone out with a perfect score for the first five frames, and then Zagi-bowled the second five. Even with this generous handicap, the scores only ranged from 120 to 126.

Round four was to be the Zagi limbo round. We just got started when the flying conditions deteriorated to the point that we called the contest over.

It really is too bad that the weather put a damper on this event. It was obvious from the level of laughter and "encouragement" from the sidelines that everyone was having a blast. Probably more fun than has ever been seen at a "contest". The Zagis proved to be tough birds. The cartwheels and ground flips were a constant source of entertainment! Total damage was a few broken props and everyone went home with a flyable airplane.

The final scores are posted below. Note that these are slightly different from the scoring done at the field and this is the correct version.

April Hand Launch Contest Report Shannon Bingham, Substitute CD

The April HLG contest was held on Sunday the 16th with a nice turnout & lots of fun had by all. This was the first contest I've ever conducted as CD so I had a lot of learning to do. After figuring I'd wing it, I bought four traffic cones at McGuckin, grabbed a big piece of plotter paper out of the trash at work & a calculator. As I was heading for the field, I was hoping the roughly 2 inches of snow on the ground in Boulder would either not exist at the sod farm or melt by 10. Had a new Maple Leaf Mirage that I had just finished Friday morning all charged up & ready to go. The field turned out to be a little slippery at 8:15, so I declared a pilots meeting at 9:45 & tentative start just after 10:00. We flew the day 1 tasks from the International Hand Launch Glider Festival to be held in June in Poway, CA. Figured this would be a good warm up for that contest & given a brief pilots meeting before each round, everyone quickly understood the tasks. The field boundary included lots of dirt just east of the parking area in order to preserve the sod & allow better footing as the light snow melted. By 10:00, most of the snow had melted & the grass / dirt field gave the pilots lots to work with in the search for thermals. Skip took an early lead which he never relinquished with Charley, Lenny & myself nipping at his stabs.

We started with the ladder task which requires flights of 10, 15, 20 ect precision duration flights – this one really works on your sense of timing & energy management. As the day progressed, the machine to beat was the Maple Leaf Mirage flown by Skip & myself. This model seems to do everything well except come down out of the sky. Charley gave us all a look at the DJ Aerotech Spectre which hangs well, but can be fragile. Charley can really fly this machine well - keep an eye on him. Jeff Berg flew a Brian Buass Feather which was also a very interesting & nice flying model with five servos including a flap. Lenny continues the search for the perfect four-servo machine & is getting his locally-manufactured bird tuned nicely. Bob Lewan, who actually has the perfect four-servo machine, flew a Maple Leaf Encore 6063 - man do they come back from back of beyond. Everyone seemed to be flying well including Byron with Jeff as designated thrower. If you haven't tried hand launch, you're missing out on lots of fun & you don't have to throw your own model according to Torrey Pines Gulls rules for the International Junior & Eagle classes - everyone can be competitive even if you don't throw like Charley. There were quite a few well-survived mid-airs, several initiated by me, which kept things interesting. The lift seemed to be generated by the road a lot of the time in the morning & then kicked by the pit / parking areas after noon. The east wind cooperated until about 1:30 when about an 8 MPH blow started. We flew until 2:30 in fair lift for rounds 1 – 5, sucky lift in round 6. 6B was the "scramble" round with Gary, Jack, Lenny & myself searching for non-existent lift. Jeff finally won the battle of the bad air in that round. The scores were man-on-man, normalized by flight group with flight groups manually shuffled after each round to keep it fair. I'm ashamed to admit we didn't use a computer. After the contest the wind really kicked in. We switched to aileron models & had fun playing last man down – yes, Skip won that too. Thanks to Barb Keer & Randy Cheshire for helping with working time & calling for the odd pilot (Me). Looking forward to the next HLG event – check the schedule.
